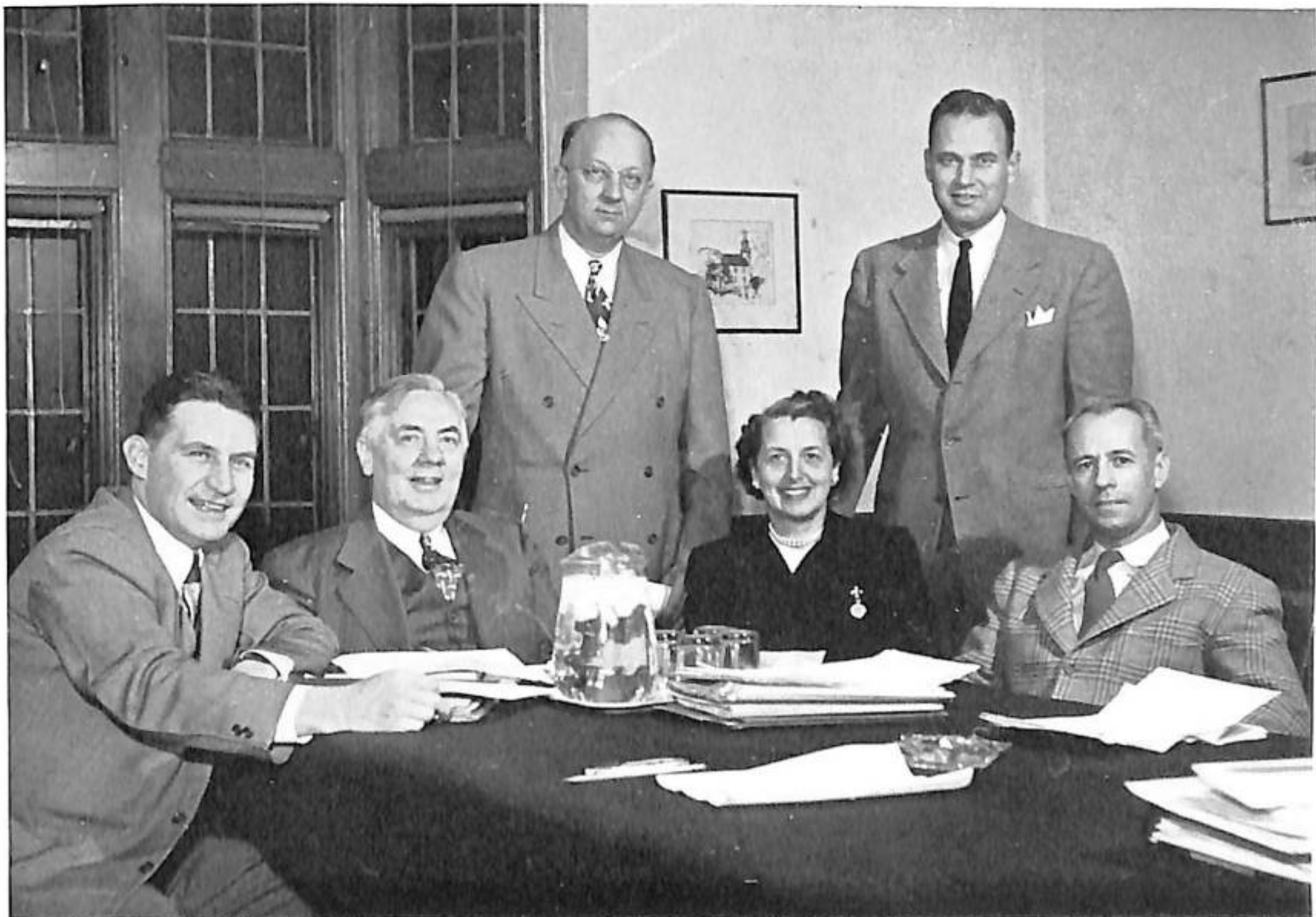

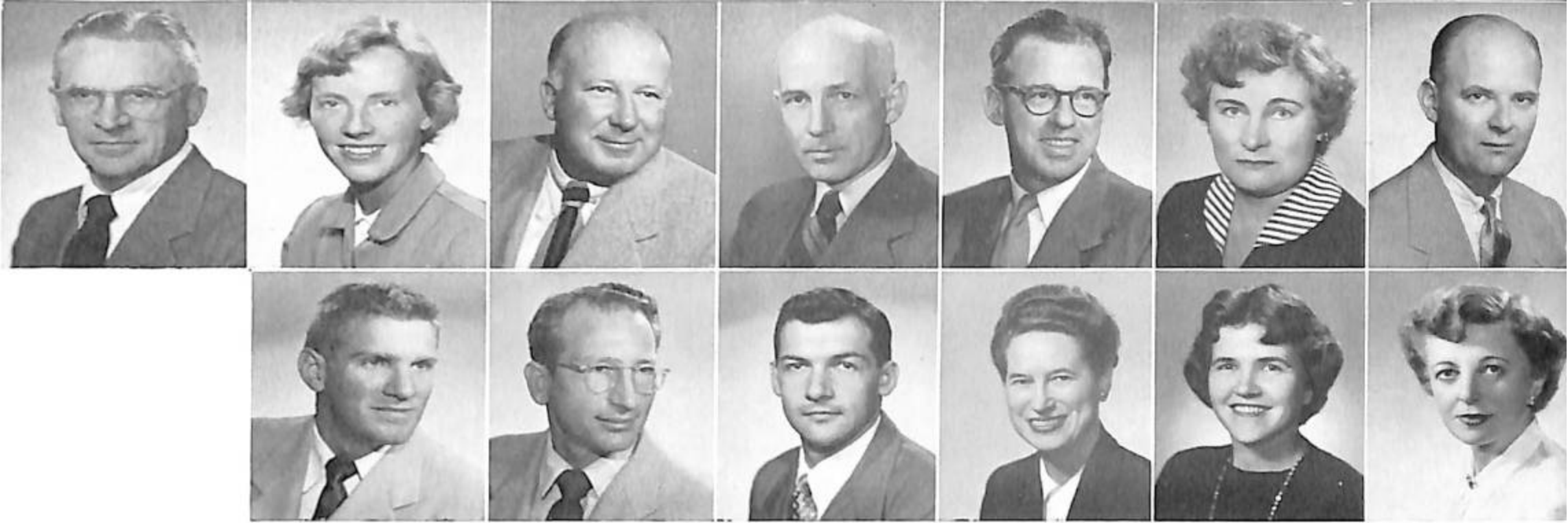

a minute without looking at the keyboard.

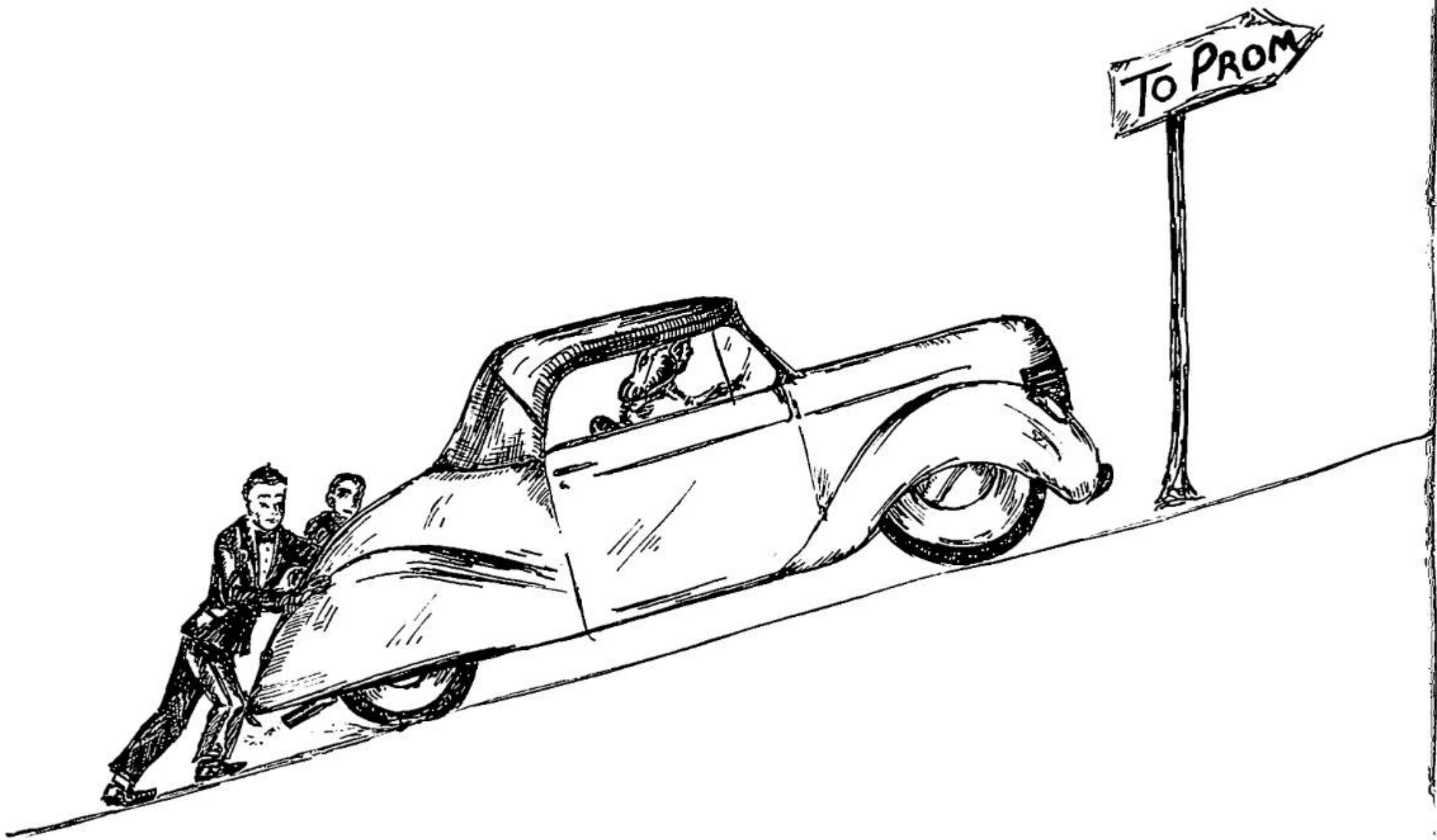

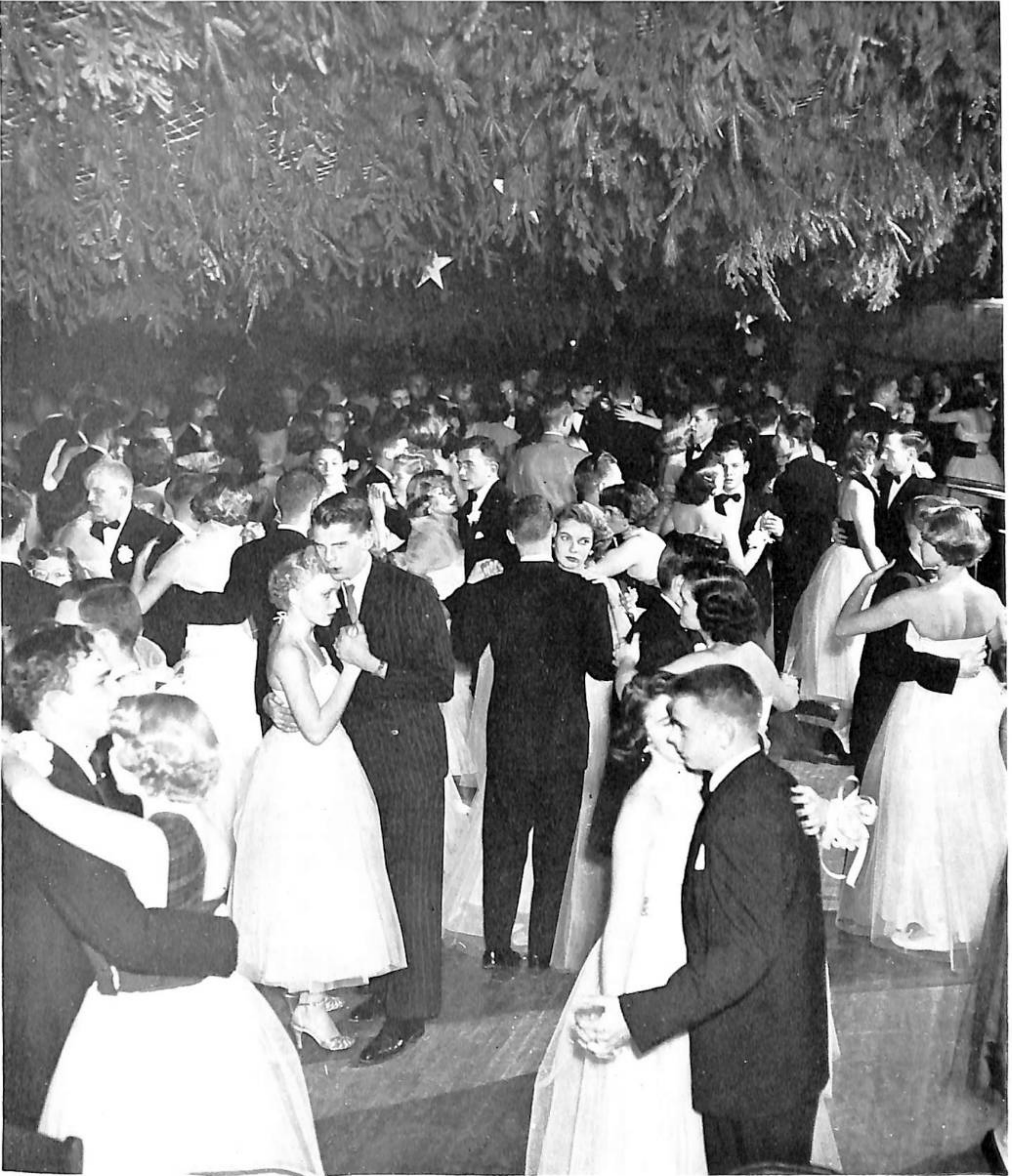
But we were used to these little scientific idiosyncrasies of his because in biology we had given everything that wasn't nailed down tests for sugar and starch.

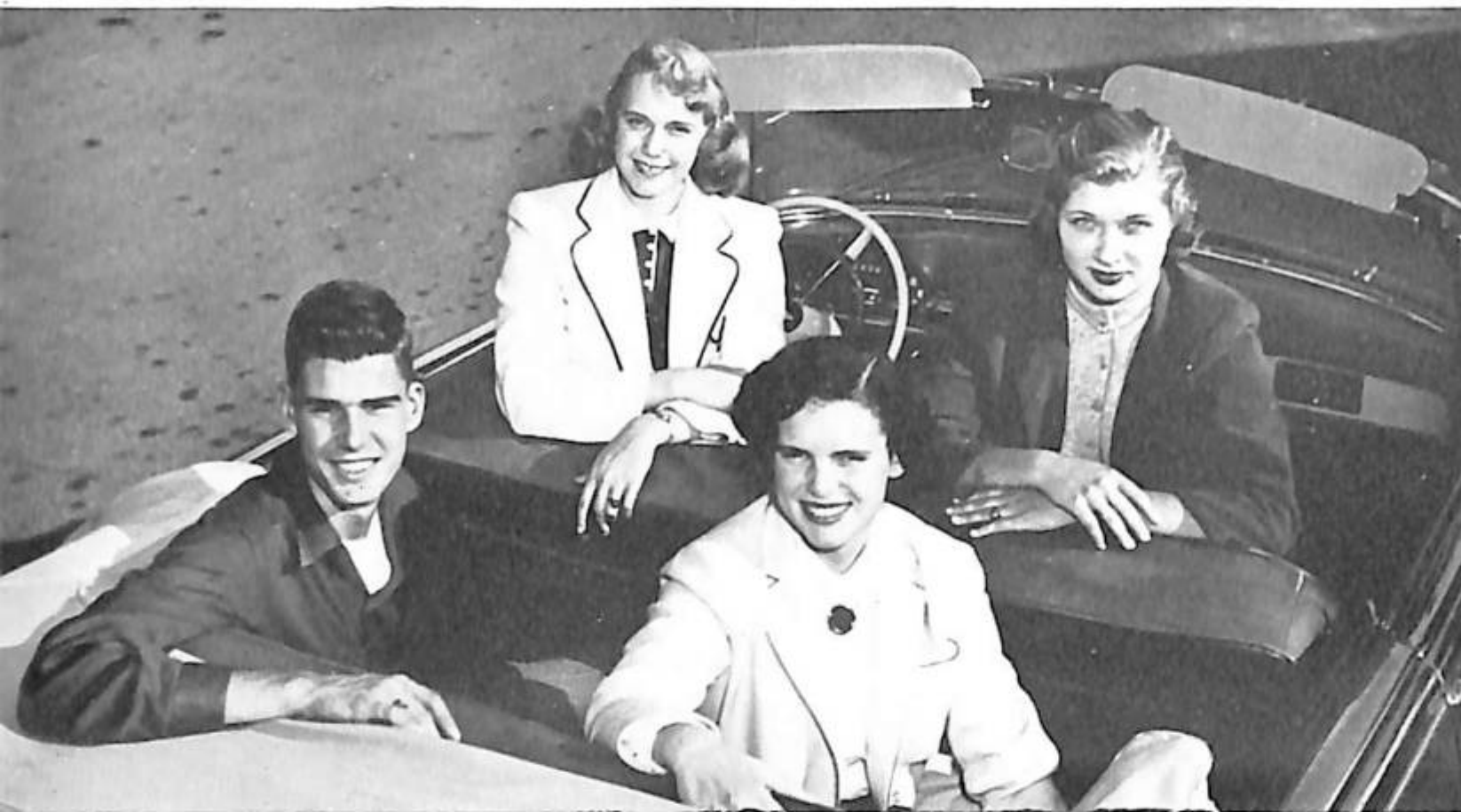

Barrington, Carole Bickell, Adrienne Littlewood, Frank Hall, Phyllis Kaestner, and Judy Staples.

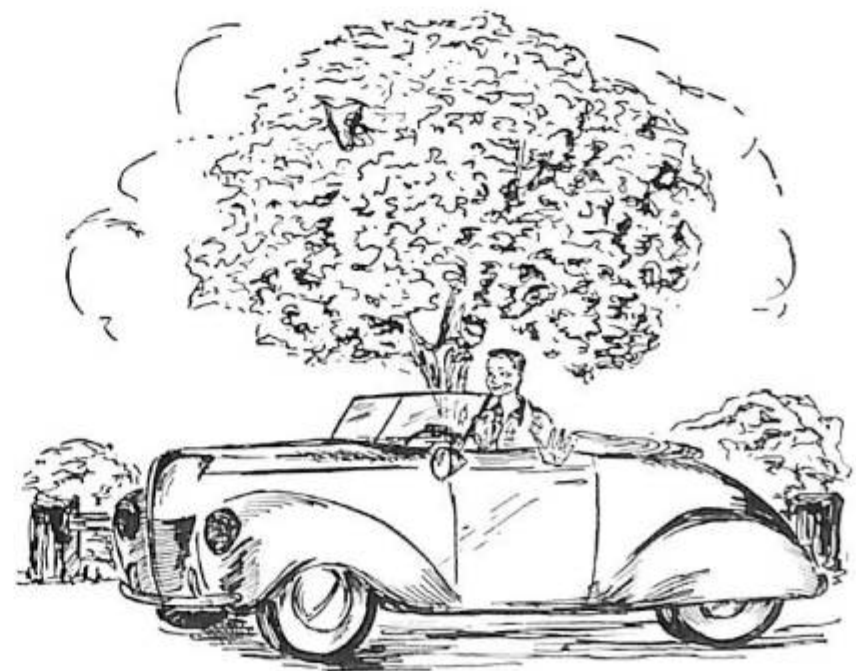
Our last act as juniors was to elect members of our class to the student government and other offices.

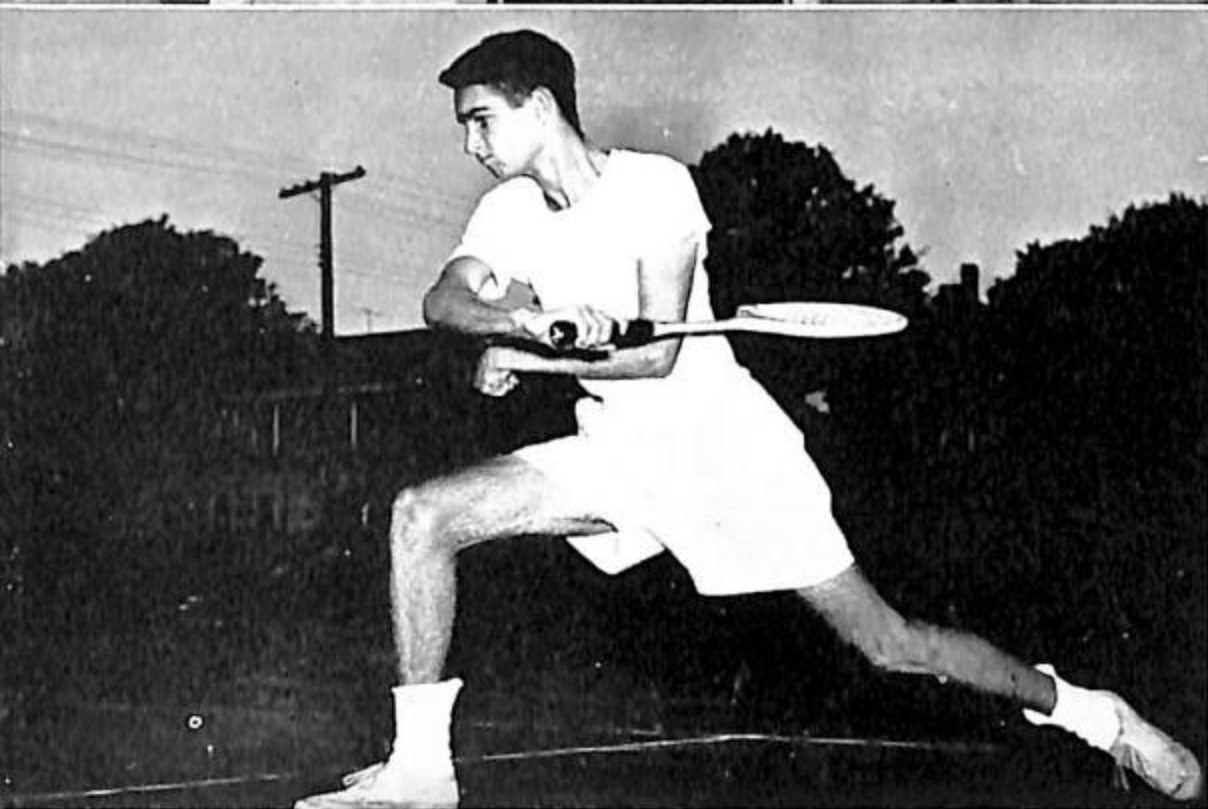

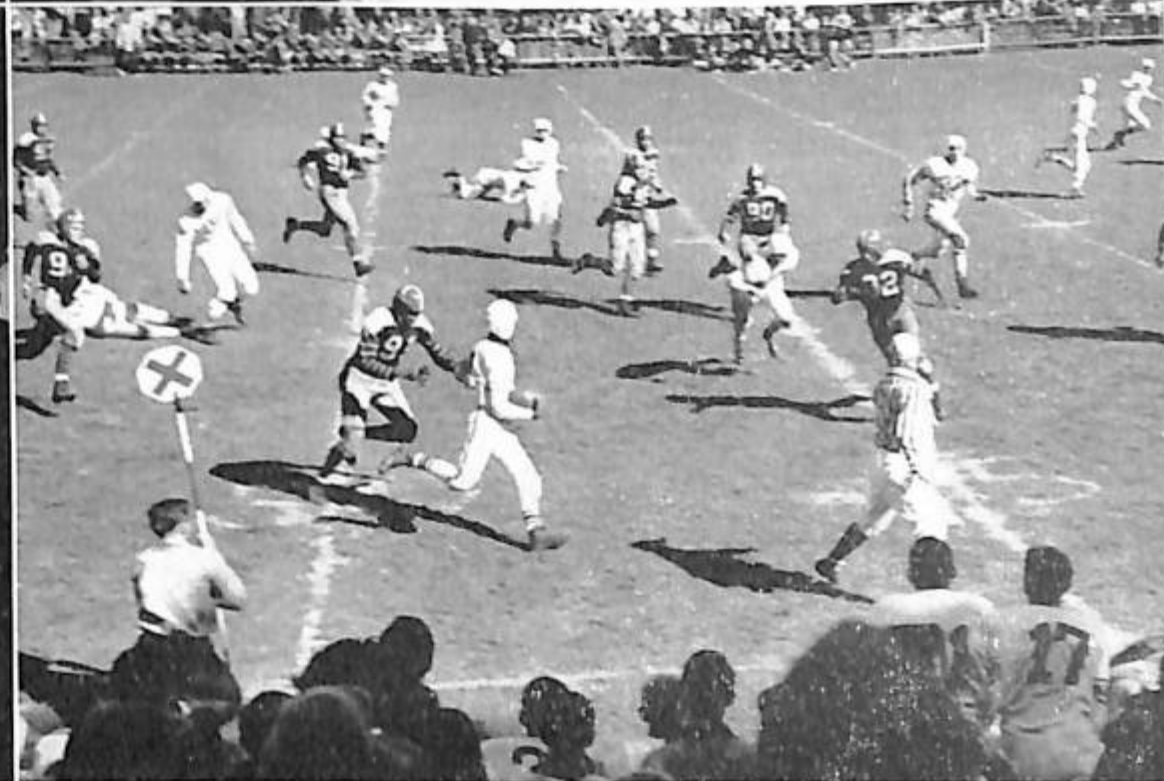

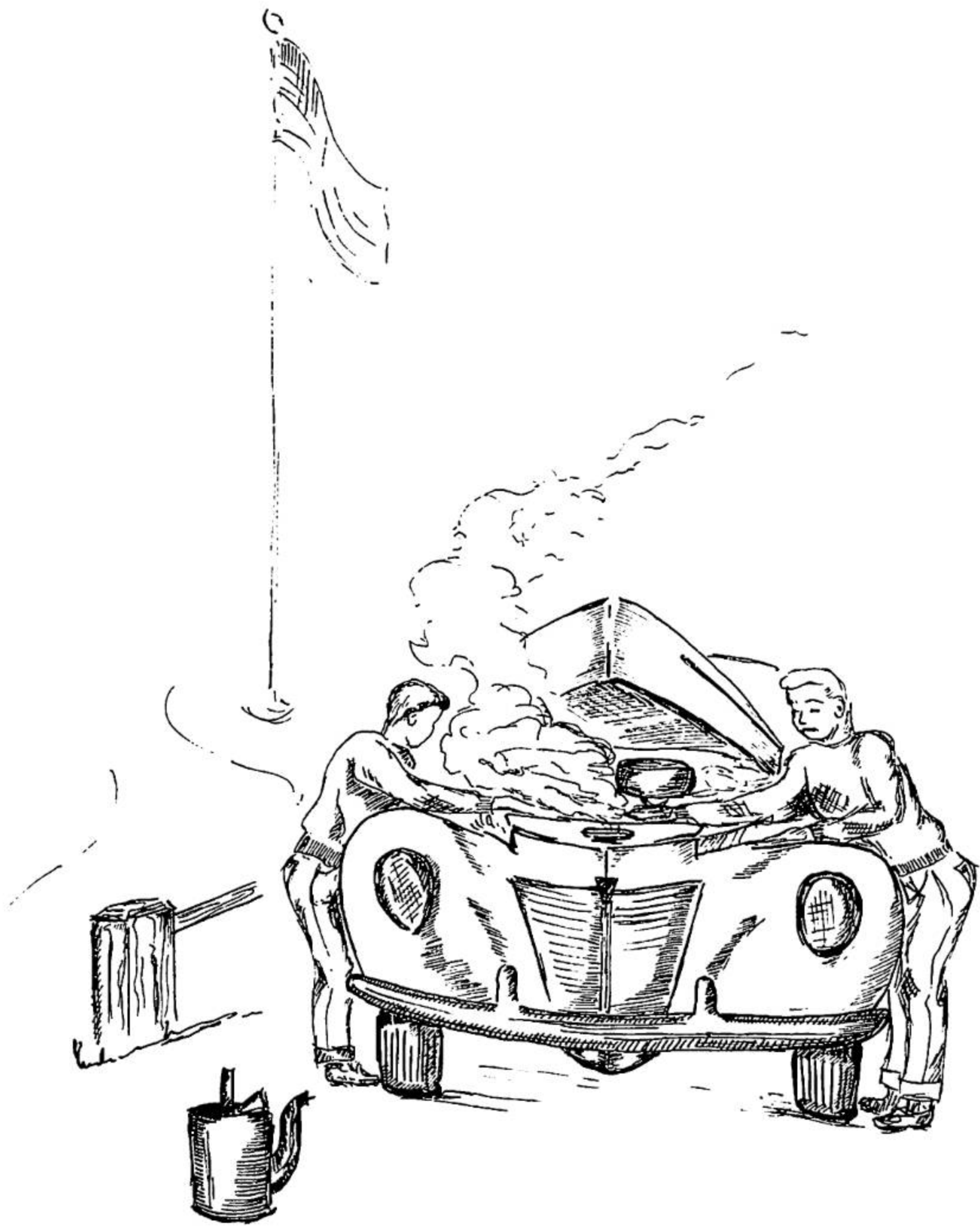

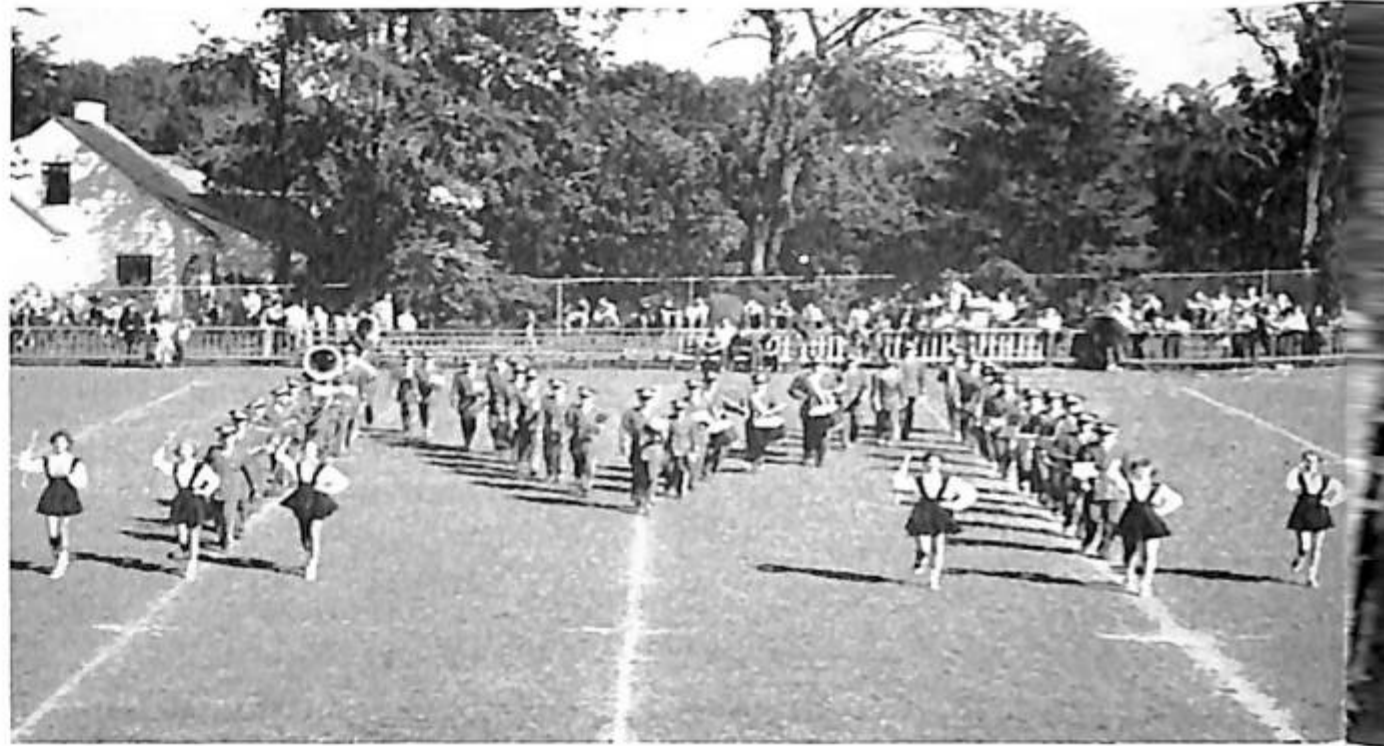
but not least, Jane Carter and Barbara Hundley, up to their ears in paint, were chairmen of scenery. On opening night, the play was a great success and the profits large.

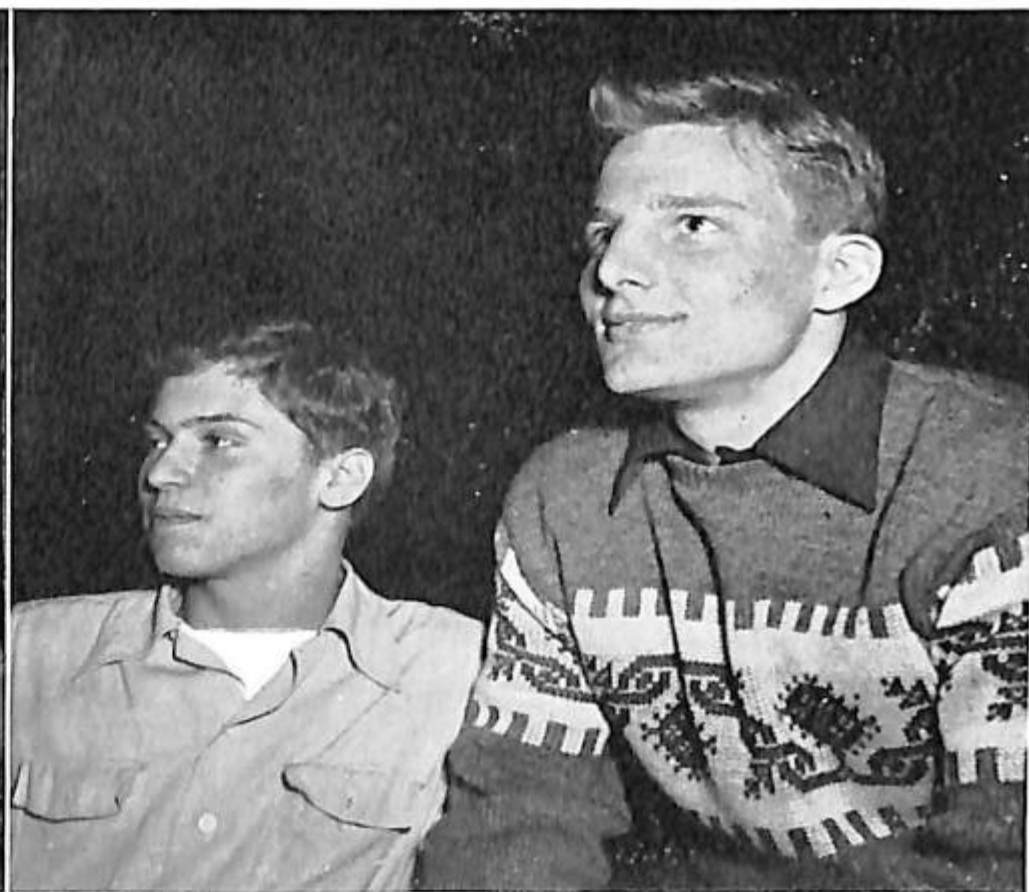

The advent of spring heralded the ending of our years at Manhasset High School but not the memories of the many interesting people and the happy times we have enjoyed throughout our stay.

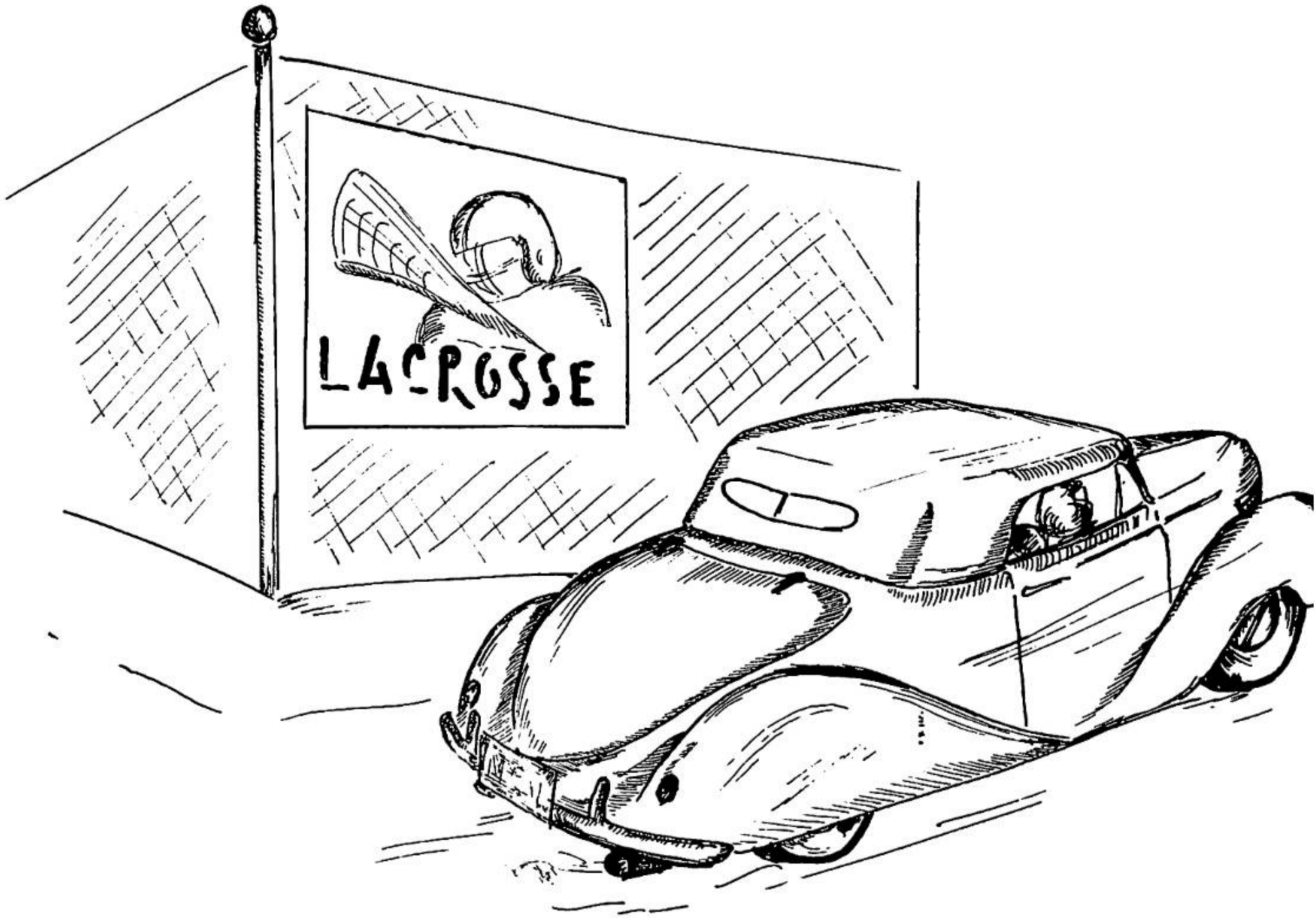

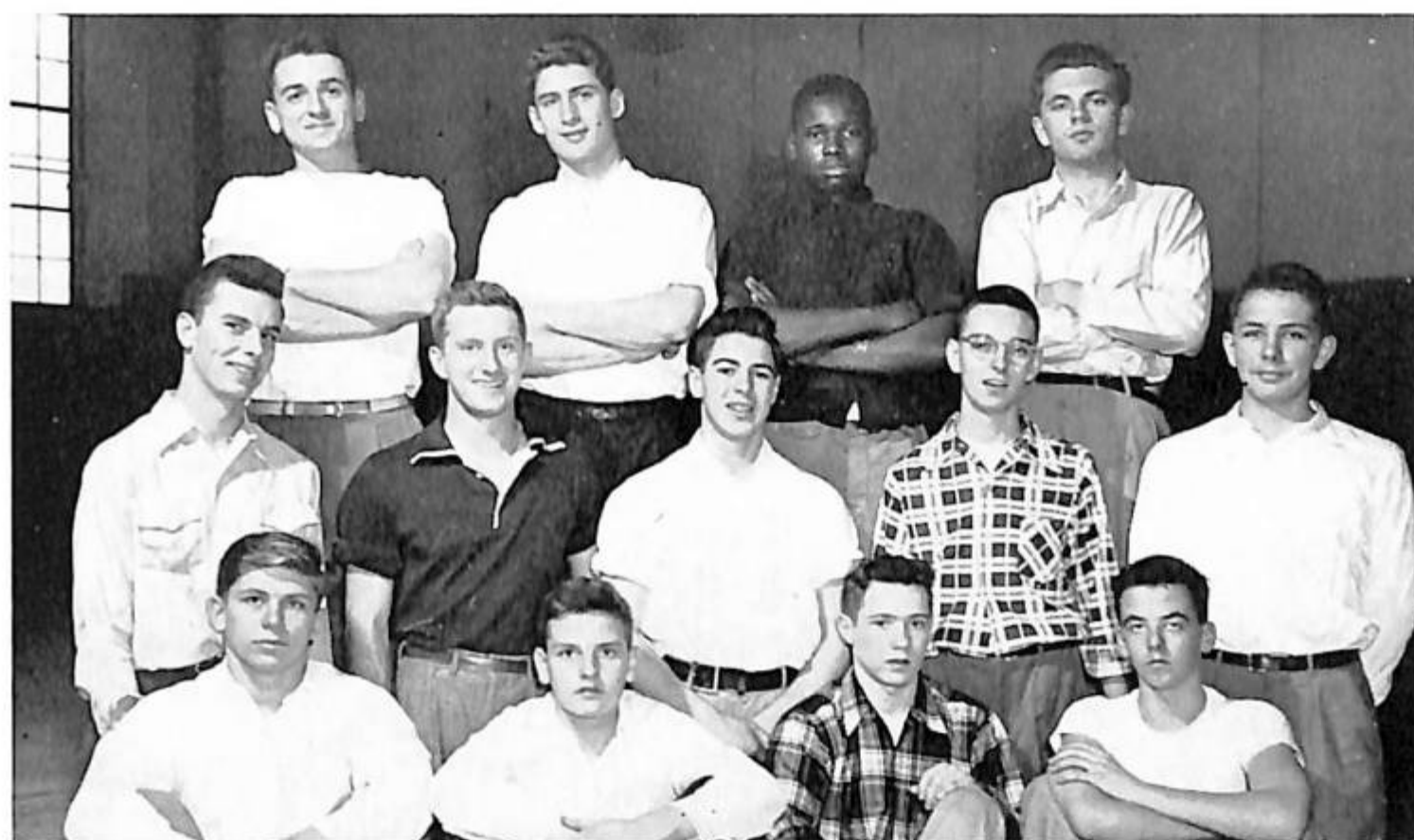

The baseball season could be summed up by saying "almost, but not quite." the Indians fell one game short of their third straight championship when they lost a crucial game to Glen Cove by a 1-0 score. After winning 4 out of 6 non-league tune-ups, M.H.S. had high hopes. It started by tripping Mineola, 4-2 but then lost two straight

consecutive match victories by a score of 3-1. Outstanding for the tennis team was Steve Heiman, who won all his singles matches and teamed with Louis Kinzer to win many doubles frays. The doubles combination of Pete Lorson and Roger Pisani competed in thirteen matches also without sustaining a loss.

Manhasset High fielded one of its best soccer squads in years, although their won and lost record might not indicate it. The booters won three and tied one of their nine games for a fourth place finish out of six teams. Don Easterly, at his fullback position, was the standoht player.

He received help on defense from Frank Hall and goalie Curt Wright. On the offense, Joe Corley and Bob Furno were outstanding along with Joe Amato and Courtney Schroder. Easterly was rewarded with a berth on the soccer All-Scholastic while Furno and Corley received honorable mention.

"This is our year" sounded the keynote for the football season. It was no secret that the Indian squad was well-stocked with returning veterans and promising newcomers. Under Coach Walsh, Manhasset football had risen from lowly depths to the very top, but everyone hoped that 1952

would be the year that M.H.S. would go all the way to an undefeated season.

Manhasset's first chance to prove its worth came against Westbury. After a close first half, Ed Corley and Jim Brown led the Indians to a 41-12 victory. Next week the Orange and Blue encountered their hardest battle of the year with Port Washington, but emerged victorious, 20-19, when Bruce Medd stopped the final Port bid on the M.H.S. goal line.

After that squeaker, the boys started to really roll. The following weeks produced lop-sided victories over Woodmere, Farmingdale, Roslyn, and East Rockaway. Brown captured most of the headlines with his scoring, but Bill Lawrence and Jim Wagner were starring in the backfield also.

Saturday, November 8, was do-or-die day for M.H.S. The Indians lined up against their traditional rival, Garden City in the final test of the year. The Trojans were quite an obstacle to surmount, but after a first quarter scare, Manhasset rolled to a 31-6 win, and the first undefeated season in twenty-nine years.

Manhasset's success could easily be attributed to its terrific line that opened the way for the backs. Don Klages and Pat Callan did great work at the ends, while Brad Wright and Bob King starred at tackle. Harvey Cooke and Dan Becker held down the guard posts, and Bruce Medd and Bordie Painter filled the center slot.

Jim Brown for his spectacular work, both offensively and defensively, won the coveted Tom

Thorp Memorial Award, symbolic of the best football player in Nassau County. Besides this award, Jim captured positions on many All-Scholastic teams. Brad Wright gained All-Scholastic honors at tackle and Bruce Medd and Bill Lawrence received honorable mention. Our own coach, Ed Walsh, to whom a great deal of the team's success was directly traceable, was named Coach of the Year in Nassau County for his excellent job.

The fall of '52 was one of Manhasset's greatest seasons. In football, soccer, and tennis, the Indians compiled records of which they can be truly proud.

While the varsity was going undefeated, the frosh were trying hard to keep pace with their big brothers. They won 5 out of 6 games, and produced some fine players in Charlie Greene, Chester Skinner, and Bill Seagrott.

WINTER

WE approached the winter sports campaign with the hope for improvement over the past winter's showing, and after the results were compiled, our hopes were certainly fulfilled.

The wrestling squad did not boast a terrific won and lost record, but it gave a good account of itself in all its meets. Jack May, wrestling at 157 pounds, was the team's most consistent winner,

with Steve Handley, Ted Toombs and Ron Daniels also doing very well. Pete Beckett, Quart Graves and Bob Snook were regular performers on the mat. As most of the grapplers were underclassmen, the teams of the future will be well-manned and capable of winning many meets.

Bowling was a sport that was on the upswing during the winter. Finishing last the year before, the keglers moved up to a fourth-place finish in the ten-team loop. Richie Masarik, a freshman, had the highest average on the squad, but John Heinbockel, Len Hill, John Carney, and John Chadwick all bowled consistently to follow close on Richie's heels. Pete Lorson and Jamie Swaine filled in on the team occasionally. Hill's 220 game was the top single effort of the season by a Manhasset keglers.

The rifle team suffered a backslide from the fine record of last year, but still managed to break about even during the campaign. Bob Dorn and Bob McMullin scored the most bullseyes for the marksmen, while Dave Dantzcher, Vince Furno, Bill Miller and John Bollinger also fired good scores for M.H.S.

Manhasset opened the basketball season with the knowledge that the only way for the won and lost record to go was up. It did. The hoopsters wound up with a 5-10 mark, highlighted by winning four of the last five tests. During the

exhibition schedule, the Indians could not do much except rout a weak Farmingdale five. Losses came to Mepham, Hicksville, Malverne, and Roslyn. The bright spot of the non-league action and the whole season, was Jimmy Brown. In his first outing, Jimmy broke the Long Island scoring record by scoring 53 points and five days later returned to cage 55 and smash his own mark.

Our hopes for a good league record were soon crushed as M.H.S. absorbed five straight league licks in the first five games. Port Washington smothered us by a 110-75 score in the opener, and defeats by Great Neck, Mineola, Garden City, and Glen Cove followed. Then a great transformation took place, and the boys began to roll. A 72-66 overtime win over Great Neck started the ball rolling and when we took Mineola by a 57-48 count, we were really moving. On Monday, February 16, high-flying Port Washington visited us, but we didn't slow down. We beat Port by 69-64 in what was most likely Manhasset's biggest win of last decade in basketball. Garden City slowed us up by a 71-59 score, but we pasted Glen Cove by 81-58 in the finale.

Brown averaged 38 points a game in leading the team's offense. Ed Corley and Don Easterly also starred, while Charlie Strong, Fred Gould Norm Peck, Bob Oberlander, Don Klages, and

Jerry Gray rounded out one of Manhasset's best hoop squads in many years.

The winter of 1952-53 most certainly produced the improvement we hoped for, and by doing so wrote another fine page in Manhasset's sports history.

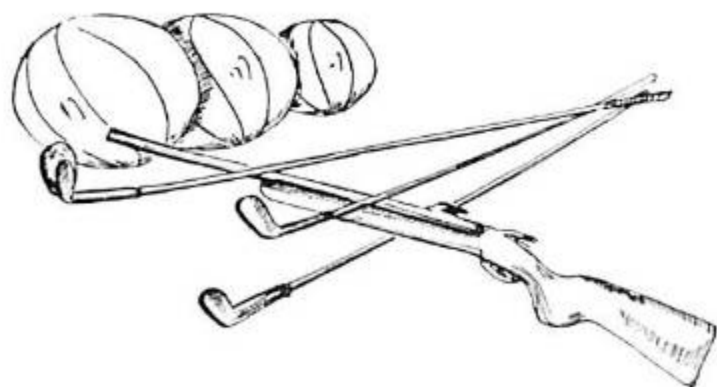

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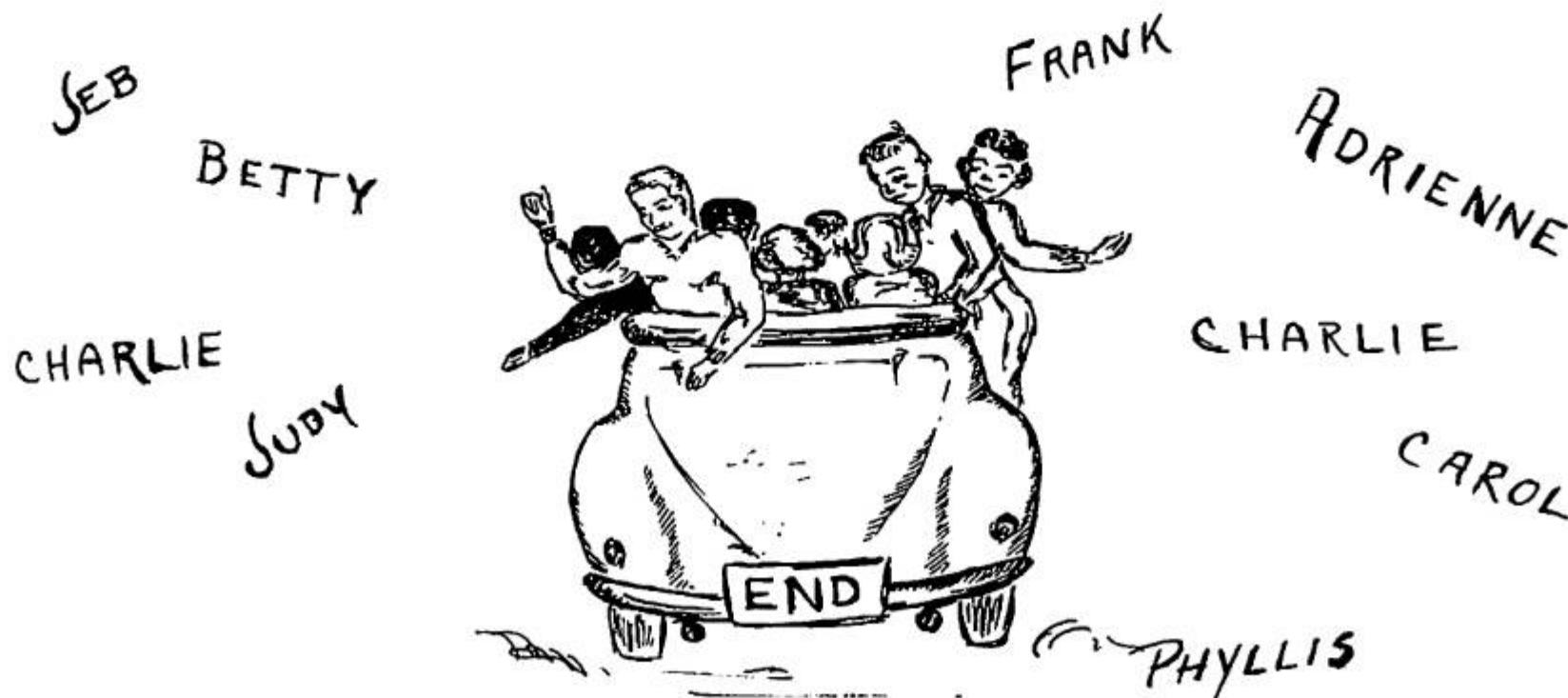
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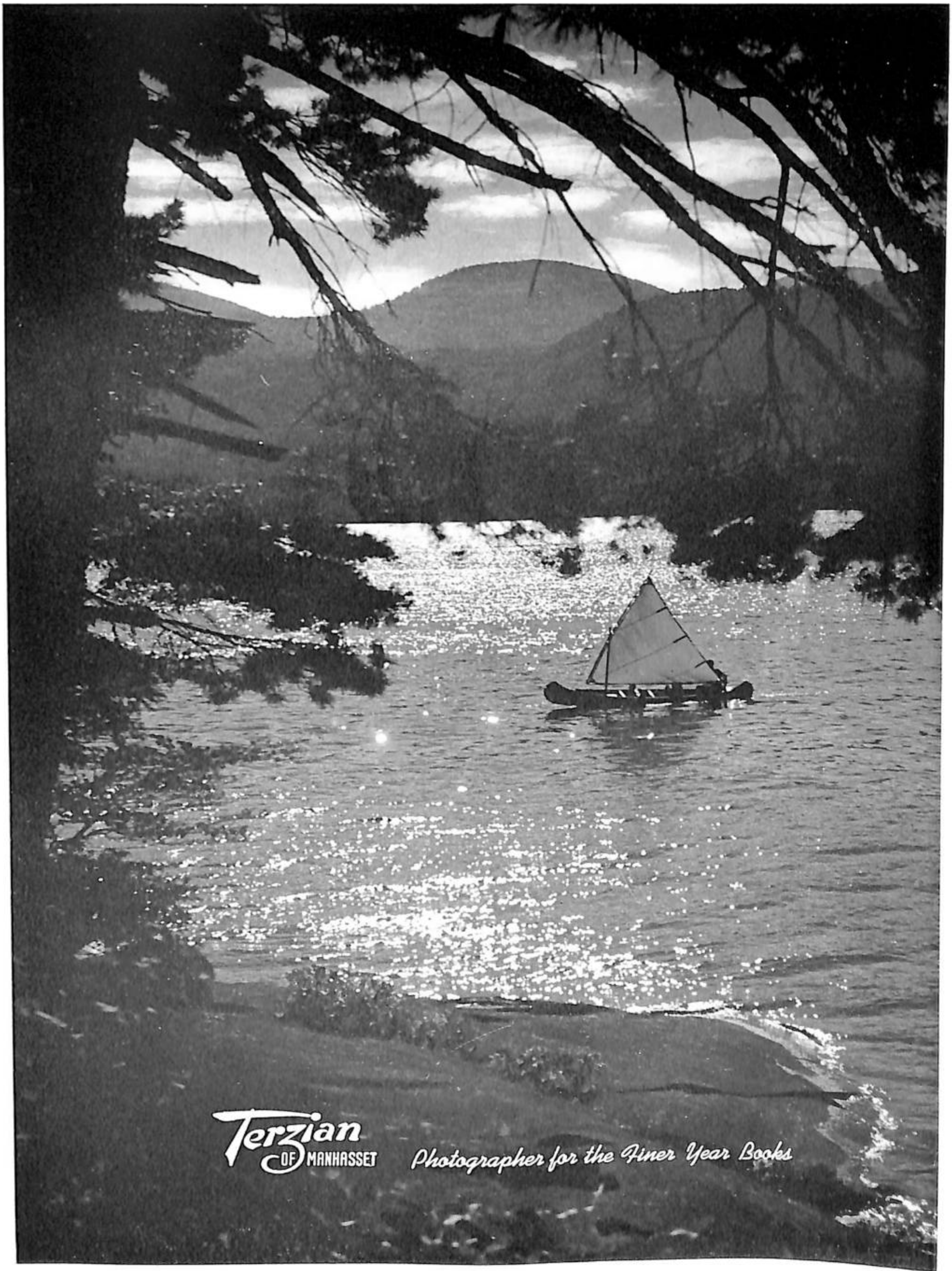
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
